



Hydrotherapy for Cats

Our cover star Dexter

Hydrotherapy for cats may sound surprising but in fact we have had a lot of success in rehabilitating cats using both the hydrotherapy pool and the underwater treadmill. Some of our patients become very adept swimmers!

A good example of this is Dexter the Maine Coon. He needed to have both of his hips replaced and was subsequently referred to the hydrotherapy department to improve his muscle mass and mobility as part of his recovery from surgery.

He had weekly sessions and his treatment consisted of a mixture of swimming and water based physiotherapy exercises on the pods. The swimming allowed free movement without impact on his joints and the pods enabled us to do weight bearing and strengthening exercises with extra support provided by the water.

On my horse.


Your dream destination?

Coco is a beautiful seven year old Shih Tzu who lives with the Foulkes family. They took Coco to see their Primary Care Vet, Steve Brawley at Vets4Pets in Woking when she became unsteady on her hindlimbs.

Upon clinical examination, Steve detected hindlimb paresis and ataxia and suspected spinal disease. He referred Coco to see Colin Driver, Senior Surgeon within the Fitzpatrick Referrals Neurology Team.

Coco's history indicated that she had non-painful and slow progressive pelvic limb ataxia and paraparesis which had been developing over the previous few months (Grade 2 Spinal Cord Disease). On examination Colin found her postural reactions were delayed on the pelvic limbs and significantly worse on the left side. Her segmental spinal reflexes were normal and there was no spinal pain detected.

Colin's initial assessment suggested a myelopathy at T3-L3 spinal cord segments. Based on her clinical presentation and signalment, aetiologies such as degenerative, malformative and anomalous were considered. An MRI of the spine was undertaken in the Advanced Imaging Suite at Fitzpatrick Referrals which revealed a left lateral (from the one o'clock to the five o'clock position) intra-dural, extramedullary lesion with secondary myelopathy at the level of the T9 vertebrae. The lesion was poorly demarcated and hyper-intense on T2-weighted images. A three-dimensional constructive interference in steady state (3D-CISS) MRI sequence was performed and confirmed the presence of a spinal arachnoid diverticulum (SAD) i.e. accumulation of cerebrospinal fluid (CSF), resulting in spinal cord compression. Another SAD was present at the dorsal aspect of C2-C3 vertebrae, however this was causing a minimal spinal cord compression and therefore it was not considered clinically significant.

The diagnosis was a T9 arachnoid diverticulum (cyst).

Although medical treatment with corticosteroids may reduce the myelopathy secondary to the spinal cord compression, laminectomy with durotomy and diverticulum marsupialisation is the cornerstone of the treatment for SAD. Colin explained in detail the various treatment options with Mr and Mrs Foulkes.

Mr Foulkes appreciated that surgery would be the best option to prevent further neurological deterioration of Coco's condition, but also understood that it might not be possible to fully restore neurologic function due to the chronicity of the lesion.

Colin placed Coco on a short course of prednisolone to alleviate the vasogenic spinal cord oedema with the plan to perform a left-sided hemilaminectomy at the level of the T8-T9 vertebrae with durotomy and diverticulum marsupialisation.

On the day of the surgery the spinal cord was grossly abnormal with dilation of the arachnoid space cranial to a linear vertical adhesion in the arachnoid. A wide linear durotomy was performed and the dura was marsupialised with 6-0 VicrylTM.

On the morning following surgery she was ambulatory and slightly ataxic (grade II spinal cord disease). Coco was assessed by Emily Ni Mhuilleoir, one of the Fitzpatrick Referrals dedicated inpatient ACPAT Chartered Physiotherapists. Her rehabilitation aims and treatment plan was formulated to improve pelvic limb strength and function plus independence with mobility.

On day two Coco was walking well with only mild ataxia; she was voluntarily urinating and was comfortable upon spinal palpation.

Colin was happy for her to be discharged to the care of her family with return assessments from Steve at Vets4Pets. Additional visits to the rehabilitation department were organised at Fitzpatrick Referrals to further monitor her progress.

Prior to discharge, Emily assessed Coco and she was pleased to find her to be slightly stronger on her pelvic limbs. She discussed with Mr and Mrs Foulkes Coco's home exercise programme, demonstrating the techniques required and ensuring they were happy to continue with her rehabilitation.

A few days later Mr Foulkes brought Coco as an outpatient to see Sam Gates, another of Fitzpatrick Referrals rehabilitation physiotherapist's for assessment and treatment. Coco received laser therapy to the affected area with the aim to reduce inflammation and aid the healing process. Sam was impressed with the progress the family had made with Coco's home plan.

"Coco has come on leaps and bounds since her surgery and we have all been very impressed with the progress she has made in just a few weeks. Mr and Mrs Foulkes have been great at continuing her rehabilitation which is so essential to aid her full recovery. Coco is very determined to be up and about - It proves to us that size is no measurement of strength!"

Coco has made wonderful progress since her surgery; her pelvic limb strength has improved and she has become increasingly mobile every day. She will continue to have close monitoring by Steve at Vets4Pets Woking and will be assessed by Sam on a weekly basis.

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INTERVIEW WITH RICHARD DUNWOODY MBE

Over the last few months Richard Dunwoody has been working on a photographic project to capture 'The Patient Journey' at Fitzpatrick Referrals. Richard took a moment to be interviewed by the team to find out more about him.

WHY CHOOSE TO BECOME A PROFESSIONAL PHOTOGRAPHER?

I really enjoyed photography at school, I have a lot of friends in the business and I have always loved travelling so felt I would like to attempt something that really interested me and would also pay for the airfares!

HOW MUCH OF A CHALLENGE DO YOU FIND IT?

It's a big challenge, harder work than anyone would give it credit for. It's not just about taking photos, there can be a lot of preparation and editing and there can be a great deal of pressure to get the right shots within a certain

WHICH PHOTOGRAPHER DO YOU MOST ADMIRE?

There are several: Steve McCurry, an American editorial photographer best known for his photograph "Afghan Girl" which originally appeared in National Geographic magazine.

Jason P Howe, a war photographer who has worked in Iraq and Colombia.

I met Jason in Kabul and I have huge respect for his work. Stanley Greene another American photojournalist who has documented conflict, violence and human disasters across the world.

WHAT PHOTOGRAPHIC IMAGE HAS MOST MOVED YOU?

There is no single photo. There are many taken by these photographers that I admire together with many by Sebastiao Salgado, who is another incredible photographer.

DO YOU HAVE A SIGNATURE PHOTO YET? – OR 1 OR 2 OF WHICH YOU ARE MOST PROUD?

Perhaps the ones of the Buzkashi in Afghanistan, the grey horse jumping the rail and ditch at Auteuil in France, the working donkey walking through the slums in India and the eight year old rag and bone boy with his blind pony from Guatemala.

TO DATE WHICH PHOTOGRAPHIC ASSIGNMENT HAS BEEN THE MOST INTERESTING AND WHY?

Possibly the Brooke, the equine charity where I was asked to cover the plight of working horses in some of the poorer parts of the world. We travelled to some very interesting places and at times witnessed some pretty rough stuff for example in the slate mines in Northern India and the brick kilns in Cairo.

WHY DID YOU AGREE TO UNDERTAKE THE PATIENT JOURNEY FOR FITZPATRICK REFERRALS?

I thought it would be really interesting and a challenge.

WHAT WAS THE MOST CHALLENGING ASPECT OF THE BRIEF?

The main challenge was trying to get decent shots only because you are dealing with specialist vets and nurses who are under pressure and are treating sick animals. At times some of pets are very poorly and you want to do the photographic brief justice. It's hard not to impose, you are shooting fly on the wall stuff – the whole care team in action doing what they are very good at but it's not easy.

WHAT WILL YOU TAKE AWAY FROM THE EXPERIENCE?


My parents wanted me to be a vet at school but I always wanted to be a jockey first. To watch and photograph Noel operating is certainly something I won't forget. The skill and efficiency with which he conducted it, was incredible.

FINALLY, WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU GIVE TO ANYONE WISHING TO BECOME A PHOTOGRAPHER?

Don't expect to make a living from it straight away. Some of the best photographers are self taught, but a lot of them are from a time before digital photography. Their framing is so good; to succeed then one couldn't fire off 50 frames in four or five seconds as you can nowadays. I think it is a good idea now to take a course in photography, I couldn't have achieved what I have without attending the photographic institute Speos in Paris.

Richard Dunwoody will be exhibiting the pictures he has taken at Fitzpatrick Referrals at an exhibition soon. Details will follow in a future edition.



Supervet Hero Award goes to Louie

When our very sweet Yellow Labrador Louie was just eight months old it became apparent to us that he was in pain. Radiographs taken by our vet at Blackberry Vet Clinic in Surrey revealed that Louie had bilateral hip dysplasia. The radiographs were sent to Fitzpatrick Referrals for reporting and the initial recommendation was for him to have physiotherapy, hydrotherapy and lead walking for three months to try to improve his overall condition.

When we started rehabilitation sessions in September 2014 we learnt that there are two important sides to Fitzpatrick Referrals – the Rehabilitation side and the Consultation side.

The people we met were so lovely and we were made to feel very welcome and at ease. The dogs were thoroughly fussed over by everyone we met so there was never a problem getting them through the door! Louie loved every minute.

Sadly the rehabilitation work alone didn't make enough of a difference to Louie's condition and we were referred to see Noel. The appointment with him was made for the end of January and

in the meantime we kept up the weekly hydrotherapy sessions to make sure Louie was as strong as possible before his potential surgery. We had been pre-warned that Louie could be admitted that same day if Noel decided his hips needed replacing.

When the appointment on the consultation side came, the staff were amazing. Some we'd already met while receiving rehabilitation, and some were new to us. But equally the overall feeling that they really care was, and still

is, quite incredible.

The appointment with Noel was very detailed and left us in no doubt that Louie needed surgery on both of his hips. We left it to Noel to decide which one to do first and said an emotional goodbye to a confused Louie, but comforted that he was in the best possible hands.

Noel rang late that night to say surgery had gone well and we'd talk again in the morning. His right hand vet, Erica, rang to say Louie was doing well and we

home, Fitzpatrick Referrals were on hand every step of the way with advice and support as needed which was quite a lot in the first


Louie's right hip was replaced seven weeks after his left and his recovery from surgery was even quicker. Again, the support from Fitzpatrick Referrals was excellent. Louie's treatment is almost over, we're continuing to take him to hydrotherapy each week, mainly as our other younger Lab, Finn, has ended up having surgery on his left elbow. This involved treatment for humeral intracondylar fissure with a transcondylar screw and a dynamic proximal ulnar osteotomy.

Fitzpatrick Referrals has become our second home. We are so grateful they are there and for all they have done for our family!



WE ARE CHANGING THE WAY WE LEARN!



vets has outlined his aim to radically reform traditional CPD teaching methods in the UK.

Noel Fitzpatrick, managing director of Fitzpatrick Referrals, has organised a new CPD conference for companion animal vets and vet nurses.

Organisers claim The VET (Veterinary Medicine for Tomorrow) Festival on Septem ber 5 and 6 at the University of Surrey, Guildford will be unlike any CPD conference before and will offer "the best value CPD in the UK".

VET Festival will take place in marquees in the university grounds and feature 20 world-renowned speakers, food and a rock concert featuring Mike and the Mechanics, plus three other support bands.

Prof Fitzpatrick, who fronts Channel 4 programme The Supervet, told Veterinary Times he had been to some excellent veterinary conferences, but he'd also attended many "quite boring" events.

At VET Festival he wanted to inspire, entertain and educate the audience at a "practically relevant level" with a packed schedule of world-class speakers while, at the same time, making it fun.

Above all, he wanted the audience to remember why they'd become vets in the first place.He said: "Vets have very little time for CPD so, for me, you must make it fun with max-

imum impact and no fillers. If you were in a movie such as Avatar there are no fillers. Every sequence and every phase of the movie has been carefully thought out.

"That's what I want at VET Festival. I want every single moment to have impact because you only have those two days in your whole year. I want attendees to get everything they want to know in one place and have fun on the journey."

Practical thinking

Prof Fitzpatrick, a neuro-or-

thopaedic surgeon, has handpicked the speakers, including a conference keynote from primatologist lane Goodall acknowledged as the world's foremost expert on chimpanzees and founder of the lane Goodall Institute.

Prof Fitzpatrick said he'd asked speakers to deliver something the audience couldn't get from books.

"I don't want people putting up slides saying this reference and that reference. That's just boring. I told them I wanted to know exactly what they were thinking on a practical level." He added: "I want to remind

dreaming and caring for the animals, and we should finish it the same way." Prof Fitzpatrick said he

thought vet nurses sometimes had a raw deal at CPD conferences with speakers coming for the vets and treating nurses as an afterthought, even though he described them as "the cohesive glue that holds together every practice in the country."

Dreams into reality

He has organised 12 one-hour lectures, from 12 different speakers intended for nurses. Prof Fitzpatrick also promised


good food. He said he'd often eaten "crap in a cardboard box" at conferences and promised attendees would get "a bloody good sandwich" at lunchtime in a relaxing atmosphere.

Prof Fitzpatrick also added VET Festival was not about making money.

He said: "It's not about finances. If I have to take a hit this year. I will. The purpose is to create change and create a vehicle where people within the profession remember why they became vets."

> Prof Fitzpatrick said he was hoping for 1,000 people to attend the launch of VET Festival, but only "a few hundred tickets" had been sold so far.

He said: "With great change comes great risk and respon sibility. Bear in mind Fitzpatrick Referrals and the vet school were only dreams in my head, the same way this is a dream in my head, but it only takes a few hundred people to change everything forever."
